Road between Kendinup and Yeriminup.

Colonial Secretary's Office, Perth, 22nd October, 1867.

T is hereby notified that the Government will as soon as convenient lay out a road, one chain wide, between the Perth-Albany road at Kendinup and Yeriminup, on the River Frankland :---

Commencing at or near the 213th mile on the Perth-Albany road, the new road will extend in a general NW by W direction for about 11 miles to the SW corner of location 141 on south shore of Lake Nunejup, having previously passed on the SW side of Martagallup Swamp.—It will then take a general WNW direction for about 28 miles by the south side of places known as the Bull Swamp, Oorongerup, Teeteenyup and Warrenup, to the Frankland River near the South boundary of location 10 on right bank of that river.

Persons are warned against fencing across or otherwise obstructing the traffic along the lines now partially in use on the above route, until the road can be surveyed and finally laid out.



NOTICE TO MARINERS. -0-

EUCLA HARBOR, WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

Lat. 31? 43' 27", S. Long 128º 52' 44" E.

Var., 19 52' East.

All bearings are magnetic. High Water, F. & C., at xi hours. Rise and fall, ordinary springs, 5 feet. Soundings at low water springs.

The Government of South Australia having directed a survey of the western boundary of that Province to be made, with a view of establishing an anchorage and landing-place in that territory, it was ascertained, after very careful examination by the officer employed, that the only practicable place was within the West Australian frontier.

The harbor is capable of accommodating vessels not drawing more than (15) feet.

Sailing Directions from the Eastward.-Masters of ships bound from the eastward will experience no difficulty in finding the harbor by closing in with the land from 129° 30' E. longitude, when they will be within thirty (30) miles of the Eucla sandhills.

Appearance of the Coast.-Should the longitude be not correctly ascertained, or unknown, the termination of the white substratum of the high cliffs on the coast to the westward of the Bight, and the appearance of some white sandhills lying at the appearance of some winte samulars fring at the foot of the sloping range four (4) miles to the eastward of the South Australian boundary (1290 east of Greenwich), will sufficiently indi-cate the approach to the harbor.

Remarkable Cliff.—After passing the sandhills, a remarkable precipitous cliff, having the same

appearance as the cliffs to the eastward, near the Bight (that is having a white substratum), and two distinct sets of sandhills will be observed — the one next to the westward of the cliff lying the one next to the westward of the cliff lying against the sloping side of the range, the other consisting of peaked sandhills—the highest of which is one hundred and twenty-eight (128) feet above high water mark, standing on a level plain some distance from the range. These patches of sand, and the cliff "Wilson's Bluff," form a remarkable and unmistakeable guide in approach-ing this part of the coast from the eastward.

Ships from the Westward.—Ships from the westward will also see the sandhills, and will, with ships from the eastward, notice that a level plain, extending some distance from the high range, stretches out to seaward The commence-ment of this plain occurs near the cliff, Wilson's Bluff, and terminates, according to Captain Flin-der's chart, in 128° 9' east longitude.

Hampton Range.—This remarkable range, now called "Hampton Range," appears dark from seaward, with generally a slight precipitous edge, with vegetation on its summit and slopes. Its height averages from two hundred and forty (240) to two hundred and eighty (280) feet.

Wilson's Bluff Directions .- Having arrived off Wilson's Bluff or the sand hummocks west of it, Wilson's Bluff or the sand hummocks west of it, close in with the beach, to a distance of three-quarters $\begin{pmatrix} 3 \\ 2 \end{pmatrix}$ of a mile, or into five (5) fathoms, then stand along shore west by south three-quarters south (W. by S. $\frac{3}{4}$ S.), pass the Delisser (or peaked) Sandhills at a distance of about a mile, or with the western portion of the white substratum of Wilson's Bluff, bearing N.E. by E.. keeping in from three and a-half $\begin{pmatrix} 3 \\ 2 \end{pmatrix}$ to four (4) fathoms, on a hard sandy or sand and mark B., Reeping in from three and a hard $(3\frac{1}{2})$ to four (4) fathons, on a hard sandy or sand and mark bottom; continuing on this course a black beacon will be observed on a sandy hummock, partially covered with vegetation, three (3) miles to the westward of the Delisser Sandhills; retain the same course of W. by S. $\frac{3}{4}$ S., when two small red beacons will be seen on the low sandy point to the W. S. W of the black beacon to the W.S.W of the black beacon.

Directions.—Quickly bring the red beacons in line; and stand on, keeping them so, when a channel will be found containing not less than three (3) fathors, in perfectly smooth water. On nearing the black beacon prepare to anchor, and when it bears N.N.W., and having opened the lower red beacon a quarter of a point inside the upper or western one, anchor.

Ships Working in.—Ships having to work in to the anchorage should invariably get their first shoal cast on the north or inshore side of the channel, also taking care not to open the upper red beacon more than a couple of degrees or less than a quarter of a point inside of the lower or western one, or the lower or eastern one more than half a point outside the upper one, after the black beacon bears W.N.W., when short tacks must be made for the anchorage.

Holding Ground -The holding ground, which is excellent, consists of sand, or sand and marl in some places, with small loose pieces of lime-stone on the surface; much of the bottom is also covered with long, grassy weeds, an almost sure indication of the absence of sea

Soundings at the Anchorage.—In the berth indicated by the foregoing directions will be found between three and a half $(3\frac{1}{2})$ and four (4) fathoms at low water, ordinary springs. Ships drawing from fourteen (14) to fifteen (15) feet should moor, also long vessels drawing more than twelve (12) feet, but small craft may ride at single anchor, taking the requisite care to keep their anchors clear.

Protection to Anchorage.—By reference to the Chart it will be seen that the anchorage owes its protection to the outlying shoals running parallel to the coast from off the Delisser Sandhills until to the coast from off the Delisser Sandhills until the channel becomes nearly closed and iniricate to the W.S.W. of the black and the red beacons. In some places will be found as little as nine (9) feet on the sheltering banks. Outside, on the edge of the banks, where the water suddenly decreases from five (5) to three (3) fathoms, the sea breaks very heavily after S.W. gales, or when there is much ocean swell outside. The range of breakers on these occasions extending in view from the harbor from S.E. by E. to S.W. thus effectually protecting the anchorage. It was ascertained during the survey, although a very heavy ocean swell existed outside, at a distance of three (3) or four (4) miles, when in from sixteen (16) to eighteen (18) fathoms water, that it rapidly diminished towards eight (8) fathoms, and inside the banks was not perceptible.

Remarks.—On one occasion the swell was so heavy that it was remarked it would be hardly credible to a stranger that he could approach the anchorage and shoal water in safety; experience, however, has proved that the shoals form an impassable barrier to the effects of the ocean swell, which is almost continually felt so disagreeably outside.

Soundings in the Offing.—The soundings in the offing decrease rapidly from eighteen (18) fathoms, at a distance of three (3) or four (4) miles from the shore, when the water shoals to eight (8) fathoms, and more quickly to five (5) fathoms, inside which depth, to the westward of the Delisser Sandhills, in places, the edge of the bank in two and a half $(2\frac{1}{2})$ to three (3) fathoms is close to.

Caution at Night.—At night, no vessel should attempt to pass to the westward of the Delisser Sandhills. If her position be well ascertained, she may anchor off them in four (4) or five (5) fathoms. Ships arriving off Eucla during the night should endeavour to keep to the eastward of Wilson's Bluff in not less than eighteen (18) fathoms. If soundings are obtained under that depth, an offing should be gained as soon as possible, for, as before stated the water shoals very rapidly under that depth.

Caution to Ships from the Westward at Night. -Ships from the westward should be particularly careful in keeping at night in not less than eighteen (18) fathoms, the more so as the western portion of the shoals has not been surveyed.

Fresh Water.—Fresh water may be obtained by digging in a small hollow one hundred and fifty (150) yards S.S.W. of the highest peak of the Delisser Sandhills. Care must be taken not to dig down too deep, so as to penetrate the hard substratum. In June, after a very dry season, it was found at two feet from the surface. It is, however, only in fine weather that boats could embark the water on the open beach, as the surf rolls in at times sufficiently heavy to interfere with loading boats there.

Landing-Place — The best landing-place on the coast is under the black beacon. At times, with a very heavy sea outside, a surf sets in on the shore which would interfere with embarking or landing cargo. There is, however, only one break on the beach. A short jetty would at once obviate the difficulty.

Tides.—The tides are inconsiderable, high water occurring at full and change at eleven (xi.) hours, the rise and fall at ordinary springs being five (five) feet. In the anchorage, and in the vicinity of the coast, the flood sets to the westward, and the ebb to the eastward. This, however, is evidently a coast eddy. The velocity of the tide did not exceed half a knot per hour.

No Supplies. Firewood.—At present no supplies are to be obtained at Eucla. Firewood, however, can be procured near the black beacon, and to the westward of the red beacons.

During the survey no natives were seen, but, from their tracks on the plain, and the fires seen, it is evident they are somewhat numerous.

Boundary of the two Colonies.—The boundary between the Provinces of South and Western Australia lies 0.58 of a mile to the westward of Wilson's Bluff.

The black beacon is in lat. 31° 43' 27" S. ,, ,, long. 128° 52' 44" E.

Variation.—The variation in June, 1867, was found to be 1° 52' east.

Chart.—A chart of the anchorage and adjacent coast, on a large scale, can be procured at the Marine Board Offices.
